Intended Message

- Research reflects white-privileged culture.
 - Measurements/constructs (e.g., separate mental and physical health).
 - Conceptual frameworks (e.g., individualistic vs. communal).
 - Survey questions (e.g., English, then translate).
 - Most vulnerable measured least accurately.



Crashed and Burned

- Summarily attacked.
 - But I tried.
- What's worse:
 - First of 3-day conference.
 - Had to socialize/mingle.
- Tapped resilience and moved on.

The 1979 Chicano Survey, conducted by the Institute for Social Research, University of Michigan, was a household survey of persons of Mexican descent living in California, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Texas, and Chicago, Illinois. The purpose of the survey was to compile a statistically representative and comprehensive body of empirical information about the social, economic, and psychological status of Chicanos. Interviews were conducted in Spanish or English, depending upon the respondent's preference. Major topics covered were mental and physical health and use of health services, family background and composition, customary practices and values, language use and attitudes, employment history, social identity, group consciousness, and political opinions and participation.

1979 NCS 1st Sample Design



- National Area Probability Sample
 - Three stages:
 - Approximately 50 PSUs.
 - Eight SSUs.
 - Addresses.
 - 1970's Census "origin/descent" Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, Other Spanish, None.

• 11,000 screened; ~1,000 interviews.



This Job's Prize: Dismantling Shyness

- The situation.
- Step-by-step solution:
 - First, a question.
 - Next, a comment.
 - Segue to active participation.
- Bonus—Becoming a sampling statistician.



Personal = Career Development

- Affinity for helping:
 - UM students.
 - Summer Latino Scholars program.
 - Stats for public good.
- Mexican-American identity:
 - Culture (NCS; methodology).
 - Personal activities.





Temple Institute for Survey Research (ISR)—1982

My 1st "real" job:

- 7-year tenure: Sampler → Sr. study director.
- This job's prize: Independence \rightarrow Growth.





Upon Arrival—Temple ISR

- Imposter syndrome, supercharged.
- Waaaaaay beyond comfort zone.





This Job's Prize: Independence

- Downside: MA in Statistics; didn't complete PhD in MathStat
- Loved challenging sample designs.
 - First task—Sample 17,500 new Social Security beneficiaries.
 - Also, Survey of Recent College Graduates for NSF.
 - Environmental: PCB study for EPA



This Job's Prize: Independence

- Curiosity—Consequences of design decisions.
 - Became a study director.
 - National in-person interview studies.
- Began writing proposals.
 - Eschewed rote, boring descriptions.
 - Relayed critical thinking leading to designs.
 - Showed our passion for good work.



Next Chapter: Survey Research Center (SRC) University of Michigan

- Senior management position:
 - 125 FTEs and 200+ field interviewers.
 - Member of SRC Executive Committee.
- Job prize: Transitional era for surveys.

Job Prize: Survey Transition

- New position \rightarrow Uncertainty+++.
- Waaaaaay beyond comfort zone.
 - Imposter syndrome on steroids.
- Huge jump in responsibilities.
 - Risks were great.
 - As was potential reward.





Job Prize: Survey Transition

- Paper/pencil \rightarrow Laptop (CAPI).
 - Sampling \rightarrow Field \rightarrow Coding \rightarrow Computing.
- Integrated Survey Ops:
 - Design \rightarrow Info collection/processing \rightarrow Analysis.
- Reorganization:
 - Cultural change needed.
 - Painful but necessary (values are essential).





Next Chapter: NORC

- Larger data collection capacity.
 - Highly talented and experienced staff.
- Corporate-oriented (vs. academic).
- Job prize: Rediscover statistical work + executive.



(3 years) DSO, then Vice President of Statistics and Methodology



First Stint at Urban Institute

- 2-year tenure: Principal research associate.
- Approximately ten policy research centers.
- Played in everyone's backyard.
- Job prize: Research "closer to ground"—found home.
 - E.g., Housing Discrimination Study.
